2020 IN REVIEW

CISF successfully navigated 2020 despite the constant changes and challenges. Fall after-school & home-school programming highlighted our ability to adapt and provide for our Community. During a year of social distancing, our Community programs continued and were more important than ever enabling youth to adventure outdoors and safely maintain social connections.

Meg Myles provided unsurpassed leadership in youth activities that enhanced Jamestown in its entirety. Jamestown leadership and the Town Council enabled us with additional flexibility to run our programs. CISF staff provided new ideas and endless energy in creating and running programs.

Along with our signature program, Sea Adventure Camp, CISF provided fall educational and enrichment programs for children. Programs were offered at a variety of times in order to accommodate those who were home-schooling, distance learners, and in-person students. Session I programs were based around sailing as much as possible since the weather and water temperature was ideal for sailing. Session II programs focused more on educational enrichment, special projects, and outdoor education.

Our very dedicated staff endured changing locations, freezing temperatures and windy conditions to provide these new fall programs. In response to the overwhelming enrollment in our fall programs, we fundraised for a much needed new, heated tent. I am pleased to announce the campaign was successful thanks to many enthusiastic donors. We now have a very sturdy three season tent with a heater.

Change is needed to adapt to current situations and CISF continues to strive to include all. Looking back, support, care, and compassion helped us make 2020 a success. 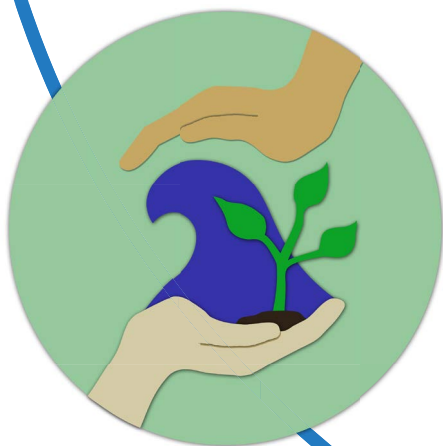

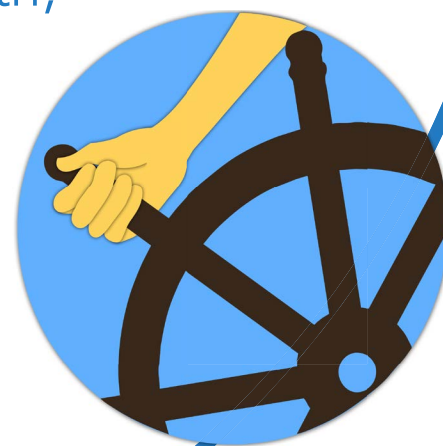

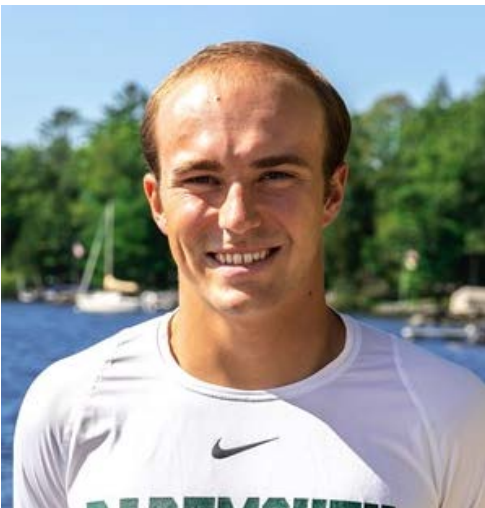
Fiona Christie **Educator & Sea Adventure Camp Head Sailing Instructor**

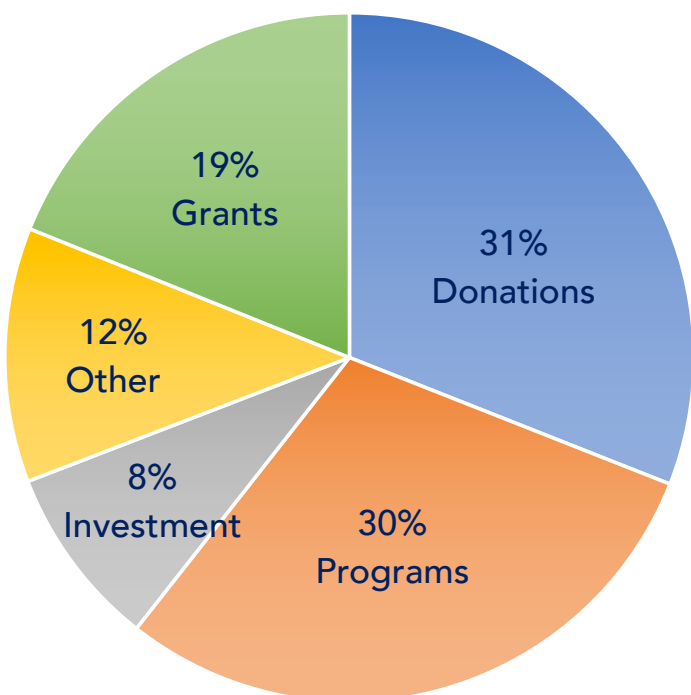

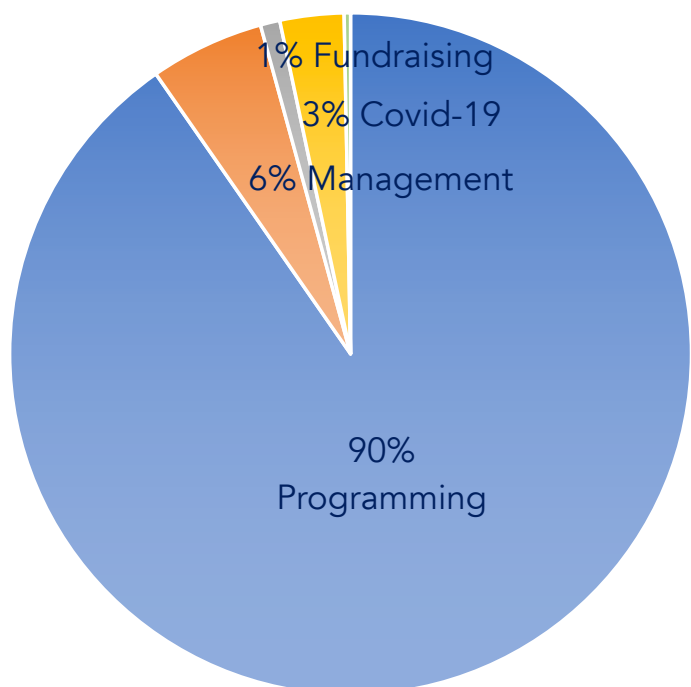

Shoulder-season programming has been high on our list of things to add, and 2020 provided the perfect opportunity to launch a plethora of new, outdoor educational & enrichment programs. Programs were offered at a variety of times in order to accommodate those who were home-schooling, distance learners and in-person students:

After-school Kayaking Offered to students in grades 5-8 at Fort Getty.

After-School Sailing Students in grades 3-8 with all levels of sailing experience joined after-school sailing at Fort Getty.

Backyard Explorers This popular after-school program allows children to explore the outdoor environment at school once a week for five weeks



FALL PROGRAMMING

Build-A-Boat Program Students in Grades 2 & 3 explore the basic principles of buoyancy, displacement, and how boats work through hands-on activities. Children work as engineers to design and test their own boats using a variety of mediums. All designs are tested and discussed and children design sails to go along with the boats. They then decorate and take home their finished boats at the end of the program!

Building a Better World, a project-based eco-club The program includes fantastic renewable energy projects such as building solar ovens and wind turbines as well as climate change projects such as beach cleanups. Participants in Grades 5-8 discuss renewable energy, look at climate change, and participate in a variety of hands-on projects.

K-2 Nature Exploration Children in grades K-2 explore nature in small groups at Fort Getty. They go on nature hikes, explore the rocky shore, sandy beaches, nature paths, and the marsh at Fort Getty.

Model Boat Building – Students in Grades 4 - 8 learn how to build a model boat of their own from an Optimist model boat kit. Participants build their own boat or partner up and build with a buddy.

Ocean Engineering: The Why of Waves Students learn how waves are formed, what influences their shapes and sizes, what is current and why do we care. The class guides 6-8th graders in building a wave tank where they can create different types of waves to observe and study.

Nature Art Nature's beauty is everywhere, and kids in grades 4-6 get to enjoy making art with what Mother Nature provides.



HOME-SCHOOL PROGRAMS

K-2 Nature Exploration Children in grades K-2 explore nature in small groups at Fort Getty. They go on nature hikes, explore the rocky shore, sandy beaches, nature paths, and the marsh at Fort Getty.

Sailing & Marine Education Sailing and marine education are combined in this program where children in grades 3-8 have the opportunity to learn to sail, as well as learn a bit about the science of sailing. Additionally, children learn about and explore the marsh at Fort Getty to see what creatures they can find and learn why marshes are so important in the ecosystem.

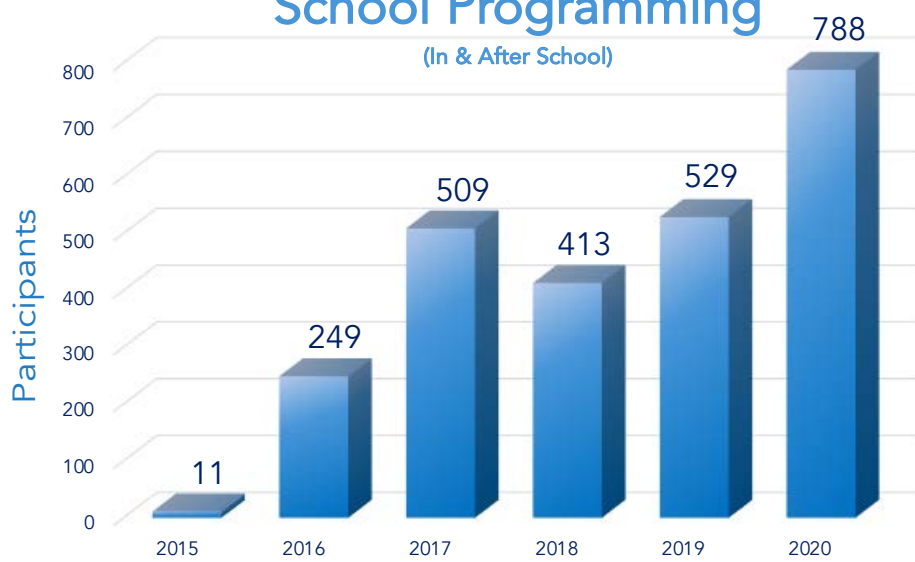
Water, Wind & Weather The science of sailing, marine education & climate science are combined in this program for grades 3-8. One day is focused on sailing & marine education, and the other day is focused on climate science activities & projects. Children learn about the science of sailing, wind, and sailing-related activities such as navigation. Additionally, children continue to explore the marsh and observe changes in this ecosystem as the seasons change.



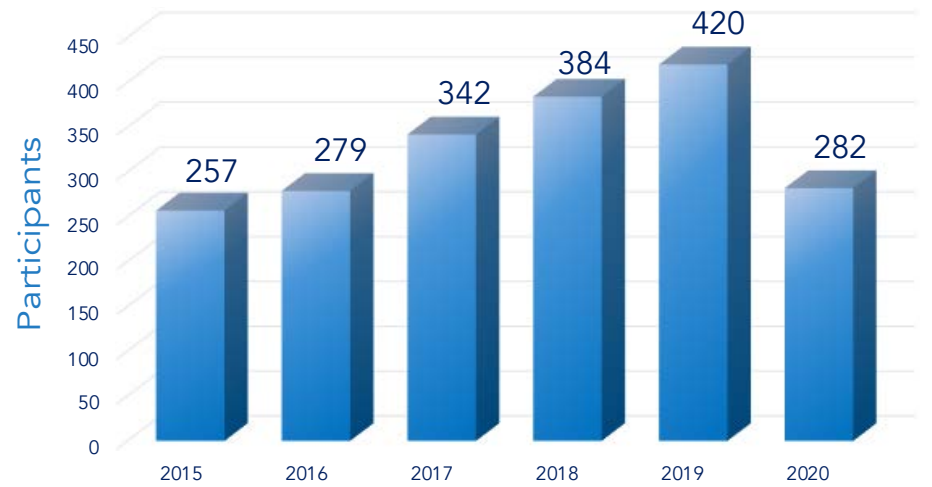
